



Peter Rabbit[™] raises smiles during visit to Great Ormond Street Hospital

Peter Rabbit made friends with children, families and staff on a recent visit to Great Ormond Street Hospital (GOSH) – one of the UK's leading children's hospital. The friendly, lovable rabbit is Beatrix Potter's most famous character and his appearance was a welcome distraction for seriously ill children being cared for at GOSH.



During his visit, Peter Rabbit was joined by Aylish Ellwood and Emma Hill from Enesco's marketing team to launch three very special Peter Rabbit GUND soft toys created to support Great Ormond Street Hospital Charity. 100 toys were given out to children being cared for at GOSH, on the hospital's Peter Pan, Safari, and Cheetah Outpatients wards. Children including Xavier, aged nine, met Peter Rabbit while recovering from a procedure on Peter Pan ward.

This project is part of a partnership between Enesco, Frederick Warne & Co.(an imprint of Penguin Random House) and Silvergate PPL (licensing agent for the Peter Rabbit™ brand). The design on the bespoke soft toys is inspired by artwork created by young patients at a workshop run by the GOSH Arts* Programme. Designers used their drawings to create a colourful, fun fabric featuring carrots and flowers to decorate Peter Rabbit's ears and paws. The Limited Edition Peter Rabbit toy holds a handkerchief along with his special embroidered stethoscope.

For every toy sold, a donation will be made to this exceptional charity by all three partners. The money raised will help GOSH Charity support the hospital and could help fund pioneering medical research, state of the art equipment, support services for children and their families, and the rebuilding and refurbishment of the hospital.

The Tale of Peter Rabbit is one of the world's best-loved children's books and was created by author and illustrator, Beatrix Potter in 1902. First published by Frederick Warne & Co. (today an imprint of Penguin Random House) the story has never been out of print since then and has sold in excess of 45 million copies globally. Beatrix Potter personally oversaw the launch of subsequent products, making Peter Rabbit the oldest licensed character in history. Today over 2 million of her 'little books' are sold globally every year, whilst Peter Rabbit has appeared in books and products in more than 110 countries throughout the world.
